



I will focus on two themes integral to advancing our students' cause. Firstly, **collaborative leadership and learning**, based on trust and, secondly, 'future proofing' for our students, by fully embracing and utilising the potential of Artificial Intelligence.

#### 1 Collaborative Leadership

The improvement agenda in education races forward at a dizzying pace. However,

if we advance as one team, working together and supporting each other, we can be sure of further success.

Ta'allum is a values-led organization, with our aims and intent underpinned by integrity and built upon meaningful, respectful relationships. We have high aspirations for all our children, young people, and staff within each school. Through collaboration across Ta'allum, we can learn from each other to make a positive difference to the lives of the children in our schools. Trust is the key determinant of an effective and ethical organisation. We must always place the interests of our students above all else. more interactive and immersive, while chatbots and other AI-powered tools could provide 24/7 student support. Personalised learning is one of the most exciting potential benefits of AI in education. With the ability to analyse student performance data and preferences, AI can help create customized learning pathways, aligned with each student's unique strengths and weaknesses. This will improve student engagement and motivation, and ultimately will lead to improved academic outcomes.

Nevertheless, the ethical issues of AI must also be fully considered. Concerns that it could compromise human interaction or that Chatbots, for all their advantages, could result in plagiarism, must be discussed. Ensuring that AI is used in an ethical way that complements, rather than replaces the role of the teacher, will be important for us at Ta'allum in the coming years.

I thank you all for your efforts and wish everyone a great summer holiday. I hope we all return, refreshed, and invigorated for another year of Ta'allum progress and advancement. Our commitment is to create the leaders of tomorrow, in a world changing at a far greater pace than was true for us.



## A Message from Ta'allum Director of Education.

A child's reading skills are inextricably linked with their success in school, as they will allow them to access the breadth of the curriculum and improve their communication and language skills. Reading can be a most enjoyable and imaginative time for children, which opens doors to new worlds for them.

#### Reading – Ta'allum's Most Important Priority

At Ta'allum, we have identified 'reading' as the key for development at the heart of our improvement strategies. We will adjust the school day to ensure all students in all phases, EYFS, Primary and Secondary, incorporate reading. This might be to their teacher, teaching assistant, peer or on their own. Intensive implementation of our literacy programmes, including Read Write Inc, Accelerated Reader/ MyON, further reading initiatives and our libraries will be critical. We know that this commitment from all of us will prove impactful and will help to accelerate reading progress.

Studies show that reading for pleasure makes a most significant difference to children's educational performance. In fact, reading for pleasure is more likely to determine whether a child does well at school than any other factor. Ta'allum's Power BI data evidence stresses, beyond doubt, that children who read for enjoyment every day not only perform better in reading tests than those who do not, but also develop a broader vocabulary, increased general knowledge and better understanding.

Enlisting the support and engagement of parents is equally as important for students

to develop active reading habits at home. With young children, learning to read is about listening and understanding as well as working out what is on the printed page. Through hearing stories, children are exposed to a wide range of words. This helps them build their own vocabulary and improve their understanding when they listen, which is vital as they start to read. It is important for them to understand how stories work too, as we demonstrate through our 'Talk for Writing' strategies.

#### Teaching and the Art of Storytelling

This year I have again had the privilege of observing the performance of outstanding Ta'allum teachers. Their ability has allowed them to bring together **enjoyment**, **excitement** and **expectation** in a powerful mix which produces high standards and rounded students.

Such teachers have an inherent ability to engage children and establish positive, caring relationships with every one of their pupils. All the best practitioners I have ever seen, regardless of subject, have been highly skilled 'storytellers.' They share experiences, share humour and a love of school. Students are guided by these teachers through the challenges of learning. Effectively, they follow the traditions of storytelling passed down from generation to generation. All societies have long-established storytelling traditions with a function to entertain and educate. Surely this is what great teaching is all about!


Stories, when delivered with passion, make us stop and think and can inspire through their message and moral. Students share a remarkable variety of personal experiences, values, and ways of understanding. The language they learn in the classroom is what they use to shape their thoughts and feelings. It is more than a way of exchanging information and extending ideas, it is their means of reaching out and connecting with others.

Children who are familiar with stories, by listening and retelling, create an **inner store of language**, **ideas**, **and imagination**. They will draw upon this store in their work and life. **Speaking**, **listening**, **confidence**, **empathy**, **ideas**, **facts**, **sequences**, **plots** can all be developed through storytelling. It is a way of developing ideas that

enable high achievers to go further. By learning to tell stories and make verbal presentations, children develop powerful oral communication skills while mastering the language and ideas they need for subsequent writing.

I thank you for your hard work and commitment throughout the year. I am extremely proud to lead such a positive team of people striving to provide the very best for our students across the Ta'allum school communities. Our intensifying focus on reading will make the difference.



I will miss everyone greatly. Ever an enthusiast of drama, I bid farewell with some Shakespeare! (from Julius Caesar)



## Ta'allum Early Years Schools Karen McBride Early Years Consultant

In Ta'allum Early Years we continually strive to raise standards for Ta'allum's youngest learners. 2022-23 sees the introduction of a new Ta'allum Early Years Curriculum which embraces the Text Based Themes and secures progression in learning. The richness of this curriculum extends much wider than ever before, as its bespoke nature meets the progression in learning needs of Nursery (KG1) and Reception (KG2) students.

Progression within key skills, knowledge and concepts means that students experience a breadth of curriculum coverage, and engage in new and unique opportunities in each of the EYFS areas of learning. Such learning introduces students to the areas of scientific, geographic and historical elements in the Area of Understanding the World. Aspects of Physical Development involve developing and securing skills in strength, gross and fine motor skills. The key learning opportunities in Expressive Art and Design see Ta'allum students engaging in learning opportunities within aspects of visual arts, movement and the making of sounds.

The "holistic" nature of Early Years Learning embraces learning across all areas of the EYFS Curriculum, as leaders and teachers engage fully in team planning, meeting the new curriculum expectations and in securing the "what" of learning. Teachers add to the students' experiences using their professional knowledge and creativity to design the "how" of learning. At all times students remain at the centre of the curriculum, learning and the provision.

Newly created daily planning formats ensure that learning is embedded for each and every child. Lesson by lesson review of learning ensures that on-going assessment is an integral part of securing effective, creative and engaging learning for all students.

Ta'allum Early Years Classrooms are coming alive with opportunities for creative and critical thinking, exploration and investigation. Learning through play provides young learners opportunities to practise, develop and consolidate their learning.

Learning in Ta'allum Early Years Schools takes place inside and outside of the classroom. During the hot months, the communal, well-resourced indoor spaces are used to support all aspects of learning. In particular, the areas of Physical Development, Personal and Social Development and Communication and Language are a focus for learning and development. When the cooler weather arrives, all 3 EYFS schools will make good use of newly purchased outdoor learning resources which will support learners develop crucial skills and knowledge in an environment where they can be creative explorers and investigators.

Ta'allum's youngest learners also gain skills in technology and computing at the outset of their journey in education. New technology resources support learning in early programming with the use of Beebots and remote control devices. Communication and Language development is enhanced with the use of a variety of recording devices such as Talking Tins, microphones and clipboards. New tablets secure early touch screen and keyboard learning within the Reception classes – important preparation for the journey into the Primary education.


#### A Surprise Visitor in Reception A Focus Text Story: How to Catch a Star

We love how invested our students are in taking care of their internal and external environment at school.






















#### **AMAG Early Year Schools**

through their amazing work.




#### **Role Model Day**



## **EYFS Good Practice-6 Easy Ways to Weave Vocabulary Strategies** into Your Day

EYFS Good Practice - 6 Easy Ways to Weave Vocabulary Strategies into Your Day


A strong vocabulary is essential for reading and writing. Students need a broad vocabulary of regular and specialized words to excel in different subjects. Teaching vocabulary explicitly, along with skills to help students build on their own, is essential.

The good news is you don't need to add hours of vocabulary teaching time. You can weave new vocabulary strategies and vocabulary review activities throughout your day.

When reading together, practice contextualising when you come to a word which students don't know:

- 1. Ask the student to repeat the word. If necessary, help them break the word into sounds until they can repeat it correctly.
- 2. Explain the meaning of the word in everyday language, using the context from the reading.
- 3. Then explain it in other contexts, again in everyday language.
- 4. Have the student provide their own example using the word.
- 5. Finally, have the student repeat the word.
- 6. If you encounter the word again, ask students to say the word and explain it or use it in a sentence again.





Repetition and review are a big part of integrating vocabulary. When students have the chance to see and use new words, they are more likely to really "get" and retain them.

Learning happens through investigation, exploring and immersive, hands-on experiences within a play-based curriculum. Our team is dedicated to bringing out the best in the children and our plan for learning is based on the children's own interests and needs. We set achievable challenges and always encourage them to try their best. They are provided with many, varied opportunities to develop and we nurture their confidence so that they can all make positive steps towards achieving their potential.

We value the importance of the outdoor environment, ensuring that children have the opportunity to learn about the world around them, in a natural and safe space. Children are allowed to take managed risks, which both supports their growth and allows them to become critical thinkers, and confident, independent learners. Every child has their own Learning Journey, which documents the progression and own unique experience throughout their time in KG.

It's hard to find a perfect balance between teaching and playtime in the early years. Developing maths as part of a daily routine is a great way to start.

During the early years, it's all about balance. Children should be learning through adult-led activities but still given enough time to play. Too much work and children get restless; too little and they don't make enough progress. Including maths talk during play can help you get the balance right.

Developing Understanding with Careful Questioning

When children play and interact with other children, there are always opportunities for maths talk. Putting maths top of mind and providing children with careful questioning can help children develop a deep understanding of it.

Be mindful of how much time you're giving a child



to think and answer. Again, it's all about balance. Give learners long enough to think about their answer and give their response, but not so long that it disrupts the flow of play.

Developing maths talk in your daily routine gives learners a chance to understand it while using real-life concepts. It also means that children can consolidate what they have learned and practice, practice, practice!

Here are some activities to get started.

#### Activity #1: how many children are at school?

There are lots of opportunities for children to count during the school day. One easy activity is to get your class to work out how many children are at school by placing a picture of themselves or a counter representation on large ten frames. This is a great way of counting and spotting patterns using ten frames.

Getting learners familiar with ten frames and building their number sense in the early years is great preparation for Year 1.

### Activity #2: sorting and grouping objects as a class

Sorting and grouping objects as a class helps children learn to reason and look for patterns - skills they'll need to master math. Give children a variety of buttons each day and ask an open-ended question like, "how can we sort the buttons?" The children should use their critical-thinking skills and come up with a range of ideas like sorting by size, colour, pattern, and shape.

#### Activity #3: Vote for a Story

Provide an area for children to vote for a book. First, ask a child to pick two books. The rest of the class then votes for their favourite book using a piece of





Lego. Cubes, counters, other any abstract concrete resources will also work.

Every child has one vote day and should place

their lego piece next to the book they want to listen to during storytime. But of course, only the winning book is read.

You can have great discussions on which book has won each day.

The rich opportunities for maths talk in this simple daily activity are endless. Children in the early years develop the concept of maths mastery through maths talk, practicing the skills they've learned during play, and developing number sense. The key to introducing mastery in the early years is to keep activities fun and part of your daily routine. The more learners explore maths through play, the more engaged they become.

#### Learning in KG – Writing and Maths



Our children love to write about their own news and what they have been doing outside of school. The biggest benefit to children is that it helps them to develop their writing skills, in particular, their ability to write descriptively. It is also

an exercise in self-reflection, which encourages children to think, not only about what they did at the weekend, but how it made them and those around them feel.

One great idea to encourage children to write is to set children a challenge to include a certain number of adjectives. To make this even more challenging, you could task kids with using at least 2 or 3 new adjectives that they haven't used before or only use adjectives on a particular theme.

Another way to use is to include this as a part of creative writing activity. Get kids to create their own character and fill out the template from the perspective of that character. This will encourage children to use their imagination as they are not restricted to writing about their own reality, they can even include some events from their own lives or classmates lives to help them include emotive language into their writing.

In Maths, Nursery students have been consolidating their learning about measurement. They are now able to confidently apply their knowledge about measurement in their play. Nursery students have become confident in comparing their observations by using key vocabulary such as 'longer than' 'shorter than' 'bigger than' to discuss their findings.

Reception students have been learning about halving numbers. They enjoyed learning this concept by halving different food items such as an apple, a slice of bread etc. They also used numicon shapes to find half of a number. Reception students also enjoyed finding half of the spots on the ladybirds. They students demonstrated good understanding of halving numbers and were observed automatically recalling half of even numbers.

#### AMAB - 'My Values Shape my Identity'

Through use of stories, we explored how to greet



each other and spread love and peace. Children then reinforce the values learnt in the story by being respectful and greeting their friends and teachers

in the morning and before going home. These values are being taught through Story Time and other sessions throughout the day.

Our KG2 boys took part in their first ever group prayer led by Walid.

Our children thoroughly enjoyed this special moment with their peers. Thank you to Mr Walid for leading them through their Salah.

The boys also loved sharing a meal as a group during our Qatar heritage celebrations.






to practice and consolidate their skills In addition, they have also had the opportunity compete to with schools in competitions such as the Winter Oatari Cup.

in groups to find solutions to a range of puzzles, exercises and creative problems. The question of the day allowed children to access higher-order questions and engage them in a deeper level of thinking.















# **Challenge Provision**

In Year 1 we use Challenge Provision to make learning fun and exciting. We have different areas in the classroom to support learning such as a writing area, maths area, science area, art area and Qatar history area. In these areas, students focus on objectives taught in the previous week which helps them practice and consolidate learning.



Teachers are able to see what the students can do independently and find any gaps in learning so they can adapt their teaching style.

Learning resources are set out in the areas to stimulate exploration and critical thinking. Activities are well planned, based on the interests of the children, enabling and them to revisit and embed skills and knowledge while continuing to strengthen effective learning behaviours.

For example, this week in the challenge areas we labelled road signs in Qatar History, in maths we were measuring using scales and beakers; in





English, we were sequencing the story and writing captions. Students become really engaged in their work and develop independence skills.

"I love my challenges because I can work on my own or with my friend. When I have finished, I put it in the green tray and my teacher marks it. I hope we do challenges next year!"- Pupil voice.

"I take pride in my classroom environment I ensure that students' work is on display so they feel valued. Come and Read with your Child – During Book Week our parents joined in to read to our classes and their children.


Maths Mastery workshop – We delivered a workshop on how we teach mathematics at AJA, with the aim of 'Developing Mathematicians for the 21st Century'.

### **Embedding Islamic Values through Salah at AMAB**



Salah (prayer) in Upper Primary is a central part of our daily routine and our values. Prayer teaches our boys the importance of building a connection with their Creator. In addition, there are numerous benefits of praying together in a congregation, like uplifting the soul and finding solace.

Prayer in Years 5 and 6 also provides me with an opportunity to remind the boys about the importance of instilling values in their homes, classes, and

everyday lives. The prayer also builds a sense of community and comradery amongst our boys.

Salah also supports pupils' understanding that we are accountable for our actions and prayers. We strive daily to ensure pupils pray as commanded by the Prophet Mohammad (SAW) and in a manner that is befitting of such an act.

At AMAB we have a very strong Islamic ethos and prayer in the congregation is central to promoting this. We are proud that our pupils take pride in their prayer and understand that it is a key pillar of the Islamic faith. The Years 4 and 5 teams work closely together to ensure all students have a designated time for prayer during the day. Embedding salah within the school day ensures our boys have an opportunity to focus on building their faith and fulfilling their Islamic obligations.

### Hakawati at AMAB: the Ancient Arabic Art of Storytelling.

Within AMAB, for our literacy week, we analysed our current strengths and weaknesses in English across the school; during this process we identified a number of areas where we could develop ourselves, which led to the following objectives:

- 1. To Increase the boys understanding of their Qatari traditions and heritage.
- 2. To allow the boys to explore oral story-telling.

We knew we would be able to meet these objectives by focussing upon Al Hakawati. This is the art of traditional storytelling, an oral re-telling of a story over a number of nights each ending on a cliff hanger. A hakawati is a storyteller, whose title stems from the Arabic verb "haka," meaning "to tell" or "to speak." They understood the impact of words, the indelible impressions stories leave on our souls. The most famous of these would be the 1001 Arabian nights story-teller Scheherazade.

We used this idea and cultural connection to encourage the boys to perform their stories with enthusiasm, passion and if possible, from memory. The English champions in each year group worked collaboratively to research and identify three stories that the boys could memorise and through their



performance, bring to life. The boys had a number of qualification rounds, they performed in class, the best performers later performed in front of the whole year group along with some professional adult Hakawatis, before ultimately performing in front of the top 3 Hakawati's from each year group and key members of their community to find the best in each year group and in the school.

We were blown away by the talents that we saw, the confidence, humour, drama, and excitement was incredible. Ultimately, we were able to crown one boy as the AMAB Hakawati for 2023...Hamad Abdulla Al-Abdulla in 5D.

The whole week was hugely successful as all boys developed an understanding of Hakawati, and had a chance to explore being a story-teller.

### AMAB Teaching And Learning Activities in the Learning Support Department

#### **Spelling And Phonics Lessons:**

Students learn about word syllables by constructing and deconstructing words through reading and writing, based on Individual Educational Plans. The LS (Learning Support) classrooms are well-equipped with EAL/SEN (English as an Additional Language/ Special Educational Needs) resources.

In learning support classrooms students learn writing through story sequencing, retelling and reading comprehension exercises.

Year 7 are working on the structure of writing a letter. After identifying the correct format, they use the format to write an independent letter. Year 6 students are using Talk4Writing to write an innovative mystery story.

#### **Grammar Lessons:**



Year 8 are working on using correct punctuation marks in writing. They are encouraged to use a dictionary to check their spellings. Students are also using pictures for ideas to form correct sentence structure and extending vocabulary.

#### **Arabic Reading Challenge**

LS students from the secondary section participated in the Arabic Reading Challenge and worked hard to summarise several books as part of the competition.

Students from Sana Al Shams Special Needs school visited Al Maha Academy for Boys on April 2nd and received a grand welcome from the AMAB student council.




The students participated in a range of fun activities organised by the LS department and interacted with AMAB students and teachers.

# AMAB - Reading? Writing? Spelling? PHONICS!



The numbers are not that simple: 5 vowels, 21 consonants, 26 letters, 44 phonemes, 250 graphemes. Night, tide, pie, sight, kind, try... 5 different ways to write /i/ alone. The English language is a complex code!



Every teacher wants their children to learn how to read efficiently. After all, the ability read has to truly become necessity

to survive and thrive in society today. So how can we teach children to read, recognise, spell and write using this complex code in the correct way? Phonics. Phonics is by definition 'a method of teaching people to read by correlating sounds with symbols in an alphabetic writing system' and, using this method of learning to read and subsequently spell, children can begin their reading journey with the knowledge of only the first 4 sounds within a phonics programme.

Phonics is a fundamental literary element that provides a solid foundation for any child to learn how to read. Without learning this crucial principle,

a child would never successfully be able to master speaking and reading words fluently. It is crucial to learn the phonics alphabet and to be able to utilise this skill to master reading any word correctly. It is



through phonics that a child just beginning to read, learns to first identify the letters, then associate each letter or groups of letters with its correct sounds, and soon after, through the process of blending, they learn how to merge the sounds together to form a complete word. This step, when mastered, will help beginners to become proficient readers.

#### **Read Write Inc. Phonics:**

Read Write Inc. is a popular phonics scheme and has a multitude of proven successes. Like all phonics schemes, it teaches children the sounds in English, the

letters that represent them, and how to form the letters when writing. Read Write Inc. Phonics includes reading books written using only the letters they have learnt at each level (and a small number of separately taught tricky words) to fully immerse children within the sound they are learning.

# Mathematics at AMAG – a skill for life!



The Mathematics Department at AMAG aims to create independent learners who are able to apply their skills to everyday life and their future in line with the whole academy mission. The development of the mathematics curriculum is linked with various subject areas to enable students to apply skills in real life context and apply and explore skills required for solving problems. We embed Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in the curriculum. We ensure that pupils have ample opportunities to express ideas and solutions verbally, using mathematically correct language. We provide opportunities for pupils to learn through a variety of different teaching techniques and by having high expectations of all pupils. Learning is also being consolidated by Century Tech nuggets and Sparx Maths at home.

# **Learning Support**

We have been celebrating our differences throughout March and April with a spectacular Autism awareness event hosting our special friends from Sana Al Shams centre. #### **Bringing Secondary Science to Primary**

On many occasions this semester, our talented Year 11 and A-Level students have been at the forefront of collaborative work with AMAG primary students. Lajeen Mazen and Muneera Al Mannai in Year 12 ran a science revision workshop in the Primary School Lab. In February, the dynamic duo



delivered a class to Year 6 students, covering topics about the organ, digestive, nervous, circulatory, respiratory systems. Not only was this an impressive display of leadership from Lajeen and Muneera, but their Year 6 counterparts benefitted greatly from getting to know a few biology tips and tricks from students who once were in their place.

#### **Purple Island Adventures**

While outside of the classroom setting, Ms Hina's Purple Island school trip journeyed Year 12 AS Biology students to the realm of science in action. As part of their study of Ecosystems and Sampling

Techniques modules, students surveyed the Island's mangrove for its flora, fauna and marine life biodiversity. There, they learned the important role of national flora in Qatar's development. In the second millennium BC, Purple Island was a thriving manufacturing hub of purple dye – which was produced by harnessing the pigments from local purple flowers. To this day, Purple Island's biodiversity still thrives for all to see, with many students commending the nationwide efforts in both preserving and educating about the need to protect the local ecosystem.

#### Wildlife Conservation

The important matter of environmental conservation extends far beyond the region's borders. Around the world, wildlife, flora and fauna are on the brink of endangerment and, much worse, extinction. وتميّزت أقسام اللّغة العربيّة والتّربية الإسلاميّة في مدارس (تعلّم) بمرونة خطط التّطوير المهنيّ الرّامية إلى تحسين الممارسات الصّفيّة المتمركزة حول الطّلّاب وتحليل احتياجاتهم التّعلّميّة وتلبيتها بطرائق فعّالة.

وإجمالًا؛ فإنّ حصاد هذا العام الدّراسيّ يلهمنا لارتياد آفاق جديدة تحدونا إلى:

- مواصلة التركيز على تطوير المهارات اللّغويّة، وفهم المقروء، والكتابة الإنتاجيّة، والتّخطيط المحكّم لإبراز دور اللّغة في المواد الّتي تُدرّس بالعربيّة.
- توسيع نطاق مشروع تقييم مدى إتقان مهارات القراءة وفهم المقروء ليشمل جميع المراحل الدراسية.
  - مواصلة العمل على سدّ فجوات التّعلّم المحتملة والمشخّصة.
- استخدام التّدريس الفريقيّ على نطاق أوسع يشمل المراحل التعليميّة جميعها.
- النّوستع في تفعيل منصّة (Century Tech) لتشمل جميع المواد الّتي تُدرّس بالعربيّة؛ لتحسين المخرجات.
- استدامة الإفادة من MS Power BI ودراسة مدى الارتباط بين تقدّم الطّلّاب والعوامل الأخرى المؤثّرة، مثل: الحضور، وتفعيل التّقنيات الحديثة، وجودة الممارسات الصّفيّة، وتطبيق السّياسة السّلوكيّة.

وجاءت مسابقة القرآن الكريم فرصةً لتعظيم شأن كتاب الله - تعالى - في نفوس الطّلّاب، وميدانًا لإغناء حصيلتهم اللّغوية، وتعريضهم لأرقى أساليب التّعبير الّتي تعزّز الملكة اللّغوية: تذوّقًا، وتواصلًا. ولم تكن أنشطة أسبوع اللّغة العربيّة بعيدة عن هذه الغايات من خلال مسابقات تحدّي القراءة والكتابة والتّهجئة والإلقاء والخطّ العربيّ.

في مدارس (تعلم)، يحظى تقييم مدى إتقان مهارات القراءة الأساسية بأهميّة كبيرة في مرحلة الطفولة المبكرة (الروضة والتمهيديّ)، وفي الصفوف الابتدائية الأولى. وتم توفير تدخّل مبكر ومنهجيّ لتطوير قدرات الطّلاب القرائية باستخدام أساليب تعليميّة مبتكرة تهدف إلى تعزيز المهارات القرائيّة وتنمية الفهم القرائي لدى الطّلاب.

وكانت تجربة تدريس (مهارات الحياة) للصفوف الابتدائية والثّانويّة بالتّناوب مع مادّة القيم والأخلاق (مكارم) فرصةً عظيمة لغرس القيم وتزويد الطّلّاب بحزمة من مهارات الحياة الّتي يحتاجونها في الحياة عامّة وفي حياتهم المدرسيّة خاصّة؛ فهاتان المادّتان من روافد المعرفة، وموارد الإغناء اللّغويّ، والقياديّ لشخصيّة الطّالب.

وللمساعدة على تحقيق أهداف التّعلّم؛ فقد واصلنا تفعيل منصّة (Century Tech)؛ لمساعدة الطّلّاب على تعميق تحقيق أهدافهم التّعلّميّة، وزيادة فرص مشاركتهم وتفاعلهم مع المحتوى الدّراسيّ، ممّا يعرّز تعلّمهم واكتسابهم المعرفة بشكل أفضل
